A performance of EPTH & GRACE

MENTAL HEALTH took centre-stage for a production that saw the entire school community take part.

It was a team effort for a string of magnetic performances of Vivienne Franzmann's The IT, which documents a young person's mental breakdown.

From the actors, directors and stagehands to the artists exhibiting their work inspired by the play, to the catering students supplying the food, there was a role for everyone.

All the music was composed, recorded and performed by Haggerston students, while our performing art teachers directed the production.

The performance was shown to our students, their families and friends, and to students from other CST schools, putting the spotlight on mental health in the trust.

Staff invited counsellors from Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) who were deeply impressed by the play.

Head of Performing Arts, Ms Powell, who co-directed with Ms Ray-Choudhuri said: "It is important to us that students have the opportunity to perform pieces that link to their lives and the world around them. It is also important that we teach them how to do that really well through the arts.

"The students told Grace's story through powerful and professional acting, song, dance and music. We feel incredibly proud of how hard they worked in rehearsal and the focus, confidence and skill in every performance.

"The feedback from mental health professionals who saw the production was really positive. They were so impressed by the depth and maturity of the performances.

'Our students showed that drama can entertain but also address serious social issues and have a positive impact on the lives around us.'

Written specifically for young people, the play formed part of the 2021 National



It is a mix of student painting, photography or


drawing, creating a college depicting emotions.

Amazing Grace

BUDDING star Lanilde, one of the students who played the character of Grace, said: "Acting in the play made me understand how it feels to be overwhelmed. Grace passes out in PE when she has an anxiety attack because of so many pressures going on in her life from school to her friendships and family.

"I think the play really got the message across that mental health issues can happen to anyone."

Year 10 Henriette also played Grace. She said: "It's a really good portrayal of how anxiety can build up in a person and seeing it was a real full-circle moment for me.

"Some of my family members came to the performance and, while they know about my anxiety, I feel like the play helped them understand it better.



On the boards

STUDENTS will have their artwork displayed on six steel panels along Globe View Walkway. along the River Thames as part of a City of London project.

Students took part in a workshop planning the project alongside a primary school and the congregation from a church. The intergenerational project is being led by social enterprise Artbash to brighten up the waterside location.

Year 10 and 12 students created collaborative art inspired by the school production of The IT.

Clarinet and compositions

BUDDING musician Fione took part in workshops taught by tutors at The Royal Academy of Music.

The year 11 student (*inset*), who has been playing the clarinet since she was seven, was invited to join Composers Club after submitting an application. There were two daylong sessions across successive Sundays where attendees were taught about composing music.

Following the workshop, Fione was asked to write a piece of music for the clarinet, which will later be recorded as part of an ensemble piece.

Fione said: "It was an amazing experience to be able to learn alongside experts at the Royal College of Music. Obviously, they know a lot about the subject.

"It was my teacher who told me about the course and they helped me apply for it. The school has an amazing music department.

"You are given lots of support in expressing



yourself musically and they are always helping you get involved in free courses and competitions."

INDUSTRY professionals gave up their time to speak to our students about their futures at our first Creative Careers Fair.


There were representatives from art, design, architecture, dance, acting, costume and fashion design, musicians, TV, radio and music. Many were former Haggerston students.
