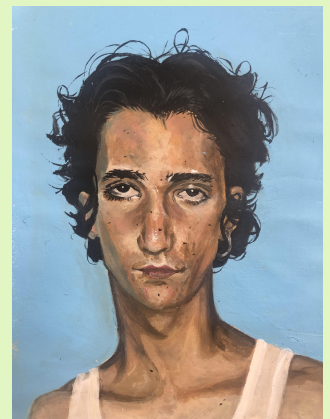

# MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents/Carers,

So far this term, we have run nine workshops and eleven trips, with many more in the pipeline for the spring and summer terms. From university workshops to theatre visits and residentials, I am always so proud of how our students behave when visitors come to school and when we take students out to different venues and locations. We often receive positive feedback from event organisers and even members of the public about how well our students conduct themselves on these occasions. We want Haggerston students to feel comfortable and confident in any setting; part of which is understanding the unwritten social etiquette of different contexts. In order to do this, we believe students need to be exposed to a wide range of workplaces and cultural environments. So when our Year 12 students spend the day at Deutschebank in December or our computing students tour the sights of Paris in February, they will create memorable learning experiences which will furnish them with greater confidence and cultural capital when they leave us at 18 years old.

Sporting experiences are no less important and I was impressed to see that our Year 7 & 8 girls' football team came third overall in the Hackney schools tournament. Great performances and still so much potential to develop and improve their ranking next year.

# MESSAGE FROM HEAD OF MATHS

*Mr Causton-Marks*

Dear Parents/ Carers,

After a summer with the best Maths results that the school has had I wanted to take this opportunity to explain the theories that underpin our curriculum, what that looks like for your child and how we ensure success for our students.

Motivation doesn't always lead to success, but success often leads to motivation.

Maths is a challenging subject that can cause a significant emotional reaction. There have been many studies on maths anxiety as well as general best teaching practice and both agree that early success results in significantly improved motivation and resilience. The tension that we have to grapple with is how to foster that sense of achievement while maintaining high standards of academic rigour and all students thinking hard.

The way we have done this in our curriculum is to ensure that every unit is broken down into clearly defined skills that pupils can practise and succeed with. After being successful with these pupils will then apply them to unfamiliar situations. These are labelled in their books as fluency skills and problem solving. We are proud of ensuring that making pupils successful at problem solving is at the heart of our curriculum. All pupils are expected to complete problem solving, it is not dependent on the class they are in or just reserved for the quickest pupils. This can mean that some lessons are just spent on fluency skills and some lessons are spent entirely on problem solving and reasoning.

To be successful problem solvers pupils need to have built automaticity with the different fluency skills, the ability to complete them with speed and ease, as well as some specific problem solving skills. Collecting the information in the question, organising this information and then generating any missing information to find next steps. These skills are purposefully built up straight away from Year 7 and the level of challenge and interleaving of different topics increases over time.

Our main focus in KS3 is mastering the content that is essential for accessing more challenging content in KS4. These skills are the prerequisites for a significant amount of content and allow for rapid progression in KS4.

If you are interested, [here](#) is a project I did during the first lockdown to map out these skills.

We have just finished our first exam cycle of the year and the other aspect that makes maths a challenging subject is the difference between what you are able to do in the classroom with support and what you are able to do on your own in exam conditions.

We aim to improve memory and exam performance through two main processes. Quality first teaching and regularly completing low stakes quizzes. Our teaching aims to create strong links between knowledge to build up our mental schema, these connections make it easier to retain new knowledge. Our recall assessment tasks also gives us opportunities to practise remembering and help teachers identify gaps.

The way for pupils to effectively revise for maths is to increase the amount of maths questions they are answering. The DPR signposts which sections of Sparx pupils can revise at home. Regular small amounts of revision on Sparx on top of the weekly homework is the most effective strategy for revision. Sparx also offers XP Boost which is the same content as the homework but harder, and Target Work which is the specific content that Sparx has identified as the most important for the student to improve.

I hope you have enjoyed reading about the thought that has gone into our maths teaching!

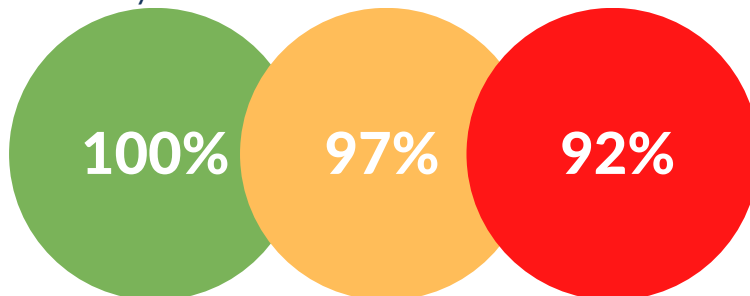


## WHERE WILL YOU BE?

### Top Tips for Safer Online Shopping on BLACK FRIDAY AND CYBER MONDAY

Black Friday and Cyber Monday have become established as two of the year's biggest shopping events, giving consumers the opportunity to snap up a stack of stunning bargains. While this is generally good news, of course, the resultant retail frenzy can lead to people dropping their guard – especially online. In previous years, a seasonal surge in cyber-crime has seen schemes such as phishing emails and credit card scams being unleashed on unwary buyers. Our guide has some essential pointers on keeping your details – and your money – safe while you shop.

- ENSURE A SITE'S SECURE**  
Before inputting sensitive information (like your card details) into a website, check that the site's secure. The key thing to look for is a padlock symbol in the address bar. The 'S' indicates that the website has been verified with an SSL certificate. Without this, any data entered on the site could be intercepted by criminal third parties.
- TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS**  
If a deal seems too good to be true, then it probably is. Be especially wary if a site offers unbelievable discounts doesn't look professional (for example, if it's covered with pop-up adverts or it looks particularly outdated) – this often serves as a red flag that the seller might not be entirely trustworthy. Minimise risks by sticking with well-known, reputable retailers instead.
- REVIEW BANK STATEMENTS**  
Even if you've followed all our tips, it's probably worth checking your next bank statement for any unusual transactions. Criminals know that on Black Friday and Cyber Monday, lots of people make numerous purchases online, they're hoping that any stolen money will get lost in the crowd of other transactions. If you see a payment or payment you can't identify, raise it with your bank straight away.
- BEWARE OF SUSPICIOUS EMAILS**  
Black Friday and Cyber Monday often bring a significant spike in phishing emails, as criminals use the events' sense of urgency as cover for their schemes. If you receive an unusual or suspicious email, providing your personal details to last-minute deals, for example, or clicking on a link to an unfamiliar site.
- CHECK IT'S THE REAL DEAL**  
It's not just cybercriminals you need to be wary of. Research has shown that some online retailers increase the price of certain items in the weeks before Black Friday and Cyber Monday – enabling them to then advertise 'discounts' (which, in reality, have simply restored the cost to normal levels). Use an online price comparison tool to verify whether these 'discounts' truly equate to a saving.
- MINIMISE MICROTRANSACTIONS**  
Black Friday and Cyber Monday promotions extend to digital items as well as physical ones. Some gaming companies will offer discounts on in-app and in-game microtransactions such as loot boxes. If your child might spend on these, you can restrict their ability to make purchases (via their device's settings) or remove any linked payment methods.
- SET STURDY PASSWORDS**  
A strong, unique password is one of the most straightforward ways to protect yourself from cyber-crime. As most of us have multiple online shopping accounts, it can be tempting to use the same password for them all – but this puts your personal data at greater risk. You could try using a password manager to create a different, robust password for each online retailer that you visit.
- DITCH THE DEBIT CARD**  
Where possible, it's safest to shop online with a credit card (as opposed to a debit card) because it offers additional protection. If a purchase is made fraudulently on your credit card, there's a fair chance that your bank will reimburse you. Should criminals obtain your debit card details, however, they could empty your account in minutes – and it can be difficult to recover your money.
- RESIST THE INFLUENCE**  
Recommendations from social media influencers are another thing to be extra vigilant for on Black Friday and Cyber Monday. While many of these will be legitimate, remember that influencers are often paid to promote products – and to promote deals that aren't quite as exciting as they might seem. Don't feel pressured into buying purely on their advice, look at everything with a critical eye.
- TAKE CARE ON SOCIAL MEDIA**  
Social media scammers are more active on Black Friday and Cyber Monday, as they know people are hunting for deals online. These scammers tend to concentrate on platforms such as Facebook and Instagram, posting misleading links that can compromise shoppers' personal details. Other scammers, meanwhile, falsely advertise products to entice users to click users out of their hard-earned cash.

## Lost property



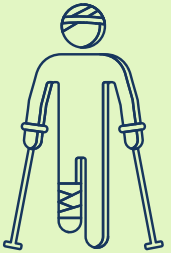
Dear Parents/Carers,

### What does family observation involve?

Family observation provides invaluable insights into ordinary family life and is often used as part of training in mental health.

I would come to your house four times to quietly observe your family. Your family must span at least two generations and have two or more people in the household (e.g. two parents and a baby; one parent, a grandparent and a child).



### What would you get out of it?

The knowledge that you are contributing to vital training in mental health, which will ultimately support young people and families. You will have the opportunity to co-create a genogram (family tree) together and the experience helps you to learn more about your family.

### About me:

I am a secondary school teacher and have over ten years' experience working with children. I have an up to date DBS and a referral letter from the Tavistock and Portman NHS Foundation Trust (part of the University of Essex) where I am completing a postgraduate degree in child, adolescent and family mental wellbeing.
